

A PACK OF RESOURCES BY
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PAST TENSES :
CAREFULLY GROUPED -ED PAST TENSES
& COMMON IRREGULAR PAST TENSES

This pack includes 4 colour-coded sets of cards (in one file) designed to draw attention to hearing and saying the regular -ed past tense ending (with its three different pronunciations), and recognising and using some of the common irregular past tense forms.

- A book contrasting present and past tense forms - listen and point to the picture you hear described. Then practise reading the sentences.
- A wide selection of cards with present tense on one side and past tense on the reverse, colour-coded by set. Suggestions for different activities are included.
- A set of domino cards which help children to pronounce the -ed ending by placing it before a vowel sound.
- 8pp book of stories which are worksheets to complete using cut and stick. A symbol line cues comprehension. Remember your screen-reader in Communicate:In Print can be used to help poor readers access the text.

Filenames and descriptions are listed by name on page 2. Notes are included to indicate how each part of the Pack is designed to be used.

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Files are listed in the suggested order of use. You may however prefer to work hard on e.g. one pronunciation of -ed at once.

cr5-00 past tense-instructions

Outline and list of files.

cr5-01 listen for -ed

A book contrasting present and past tense forms. Listen and point, and then practise reading the sentences.

cr5-02 past tense cards

A wide selection of cards with present tense on one side and past tense on the reverse, colour-coded by set. These provide the main practice material.

cr5-03 past tense dominoes

A set of dominos cards. Placing the -ed ending before a vowel sound helps children to hear, and therefore to pronounce it.

cr5-04 past tense cut-&-stick

8 page book of worksheets for cut-&-stick tasks. Remember your screen-reader in Communicate: In Print can be used to help poor readers access the text.
